1969 PARATHON BEGUN SATURDAY CRACKERS WAKE CAMPERS



"Rise and Shine," or "Up and adam" was not what was said when Paradox (and the surrounding towns) were awakened to the sound of fire-crackers and the sight of eerie dripping fires. A 46r is one who has climbed all of the 46 highest peaks in the Adirondack mountains, first climbed by Robert and George Marshall and their guide and friend, Herbert Clark, in 1924.

Since these three ventured up the 46 a great desire to repeat their feat has been cherished by many. However, only 218 people have been able to complete this work. It is truly a fantastic accomplishment for our five who have spent over three years working, climbing, and hiking all of the peaks. They have put endless time and effort into getting every one of the mountains and their effort saw completion yesterday on Street and Nye.

Exactly half of the peaks are trailless, including the two done yesterday.

Last Sunday all of Camp Paradox was treated to a comedy called In The Days of Like King Arthur. In simple truth it was the biggest crowd-pleaser in the past six years of Footlighter history. The play starred Dave Kalodner as King Arthur, Steve Hollenberg as Merlin the Magician, Larry Gordon as Guinevere, and Barry Stepner as Lancelot. Ken Zolot lent his talents to the role of Mordred and the rest of the cast included Doug Davidoff, Jeff Singer, and Bob Sturm.

King Arthur is about an off-beat king who is letting his round table go to pot. He is attacked by evil Sir Mordred but when there looks to be no way out he uses his jazz trumpet, the way the Pied Piper of Hamelin did, and drives the enemy away.

The play, though a bit shakey at first, had the audience behind it and they helped to inspire confidence in the actors. They applauded laugh lines and went right along with the action on stage. One of the reasons why the audience was alive was Dave Kalodner. He hammed up Arthur but did not overplay the role, and he kept a professional cool throughout the proceedings. This was easily Dave's best role so far. Larry Gordon also deserves credit for really playing the tough role of Guin to a hilt.

It seemed that he almost was the Queen. Steve Hollenberg as Merlin was also funny in a mystical way. The rest of the cast was animated too, and became even more so under the great audience reaction.

The purple set with golden fleurs-de-lis was done by Bruce Inglis and the direction by Bruce Singer. This is Bruce Singer's second directorial effort and we hope to see much, much more of him in the future.

The easiest peaks of the 46 were knocked off by the five explorers in the first three years of hiking. This year the Paradoxians climbed the harder trailless peaks. It took much courage, agility, and strength to hike this year.

Sacrificing many valuable activities back at camp, they ventured many miles to seek their goal. These five loved every single minute of their work. They were all close-knit with an amazing common bond.

Rising many hours before dawn, as on previous hikes, the five, plus campcraft counselor Walt Teunisen on his day off, started climbing up from Adirondack Loj. A drive never before experienced by anyone else was with the hikers. On Street, Number 45, the group was ready to jump to Nye. After hitting number 46 smiles and laughter never had before were struck. It was the greatest day ever for them.

Bobby Green and Alan Miller did just that by winning 8-2 in a very impressive showing. But the 14 and under team of Marc Margolius and Scott Davis went down to a tough loss in a well-played match, 9-7. This left Green and Miller as Paradox's only hope. They played well but they were simply outclassed by a fine team by scores of 6-1, 6-2. They are the only Paradoxians to reach the finals in either tennis tournament in two years. 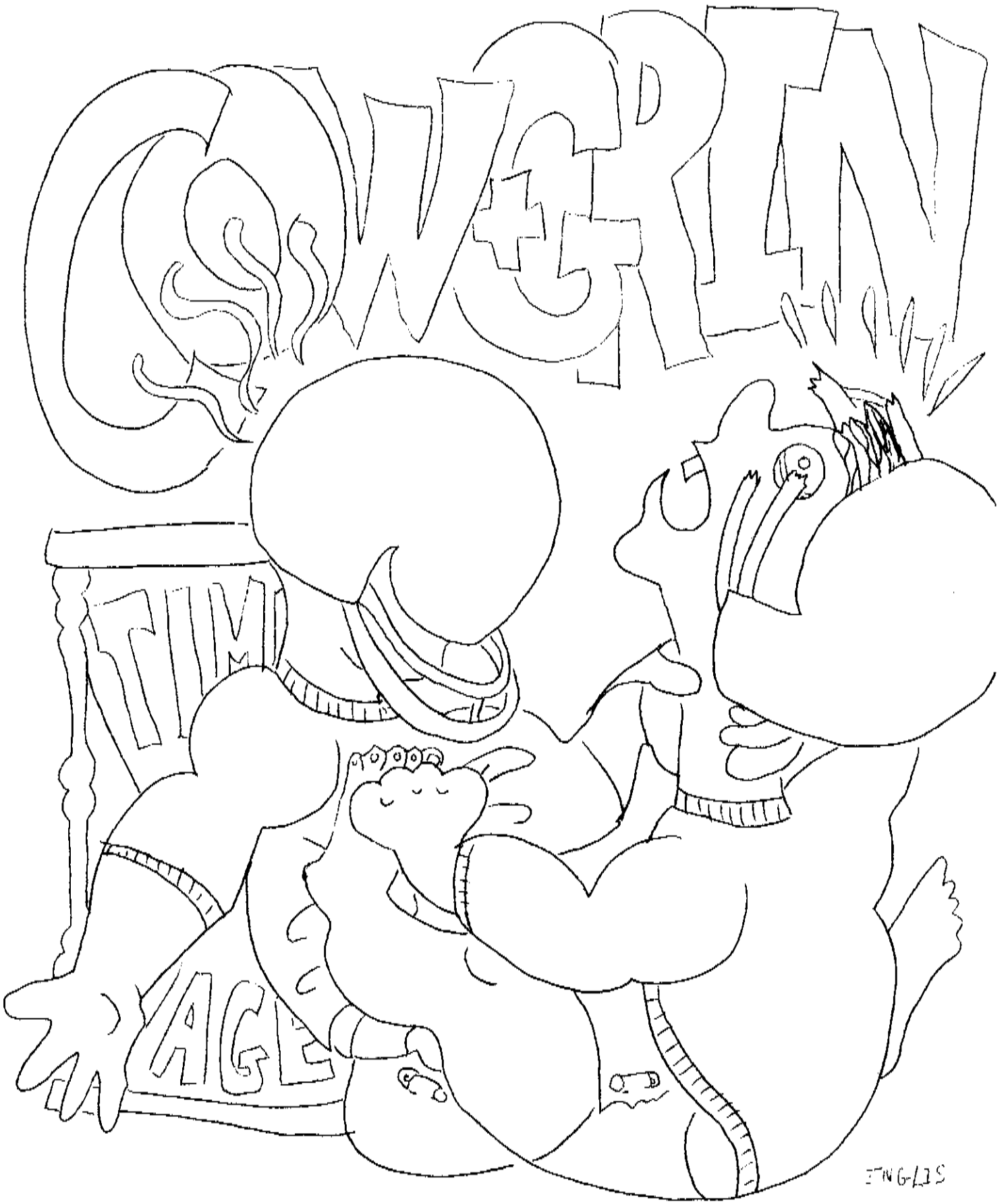
